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

The God That Christians Worship is A God Of Love

It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. THE NOT SO RARE ACTS OF VIOLENCE AGAINST THE CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY AND THE SILENCE OF THE AUTHORITIES

Of late, due to the rise of so called "nationalism", voices have been heard, although not very loud, yet disturbing, that the Christian faith opposes other faiths in the country and it has also been coloured with the paint of being 'western'. Churches have been attacked, desecrated and even damaged, by so called 'fringe' elements, who although numerically few, appear not to be so, going by the sepulchral silence and chronic paralysis with which those actions have been addressed by those who are the constitutional guardians of the rights of citizens, and more specially of the minority groups.

It has often been heard, 'hamara desh bahut baddha hai, aur agar aisa kuch chotta motta anhona cheez hota hai to koi apsoch karne ki zaruri nahim hai'" (ours is a big country, and if anything small that should not have happened, happens, there must not arise a reason to get upset), which could be taken literally, but the deafening silence does not come under that presumption. Be it as may, India is not only a great country but is also a great civilization and there is a big difference between the two. The 'greatness' of the latter by far, excels that of the former, which rightly understood means that however big the country may be, it is its civilization that gives it its true identity, not its geographic or population magnitude. The mention of 'civilization' has been specifically put in place to state that our country of sages and saints, of philosophers like Adi Ankaracharya, Ramanuja and Madhavacharya, and philosophical thoughts such as Advaita

Vedanta and Shamkhya, and wise and holy men such Valmiki, Gautama Budha, Charvaka, Kabir, Thiruvalluvar, Gurudev, Guru Nanak, Mother Theresa and Mahatma Gandhi, Bhimrao Ambedkar and Maulana Azad etc, literary gems such as the Vedas, the Upanishads, the Bhagvad Gita and Dhamamapadda, Ramayana and Mahabharata and our scientific achievements no less, it cannot be stated that we are second to any other civilization past or present.

I believe that India and Indians stand far away and higher than what the fringe does. The danger however must not be ignored. Ideas are far more powerful than actions or words, and if reactions to such actions of hate, remain tepid and unclear, confusion is the logical result and since that noise is heard louder, the truth becomes fader and fader. It is therefore of paramount importance for India and Indians to recall, what they know at the back of their minds, and bring it forward to deny and condemn the idea that the fringe pretends to state, and which the tacit silence of those whose duty was to stop it, mutely lets/watches it happen.

ARE THE TEACHINGS OF JESUS, ANTAGONISTIC TO OTHER RELIGIONS?

There are 3 allegations levelled against Christians: i. Their faith is foreign; 2. The Christian teaching opposes Hindu faith; 3. They convert.

JESUS AND HIS TEACHINGS ARE AS ASIAN AS ANY OTHER'S: First of all, Jesus Christ was born, lived and died in Asia. Although neither the colour of the skin nor one's ethnicity have anything to do with what a person is. Jesus was an Asian, as any one else is Asian. Fortunately for an Indian, the best and the most scientific explanation of the origins of what we call Indians today, is knowing that we are

a nation of old immigrants, as the USA is made of new immigrants. That and only that explains the great diversity of languages and colour even in a place as small as Punjab and Haryana, or as close as Kerala and Tamilnadu, or Assam and Meghalaya and Nagaland. The less said about the place of birth of man to define as a 'foreigner' to India, the better it is, else it will lead us deeper into the pit of confusion. Since Christ is from "Israel" he is an 'Eurasian' and by implication (indian) as any other indian, since our forefathers are believed to come from 'Eurasia' (although this argument of being western about Christianity is hollow to say the least). Not only was Jesus born and lived in Israel, his teachings are entirely based and explained in pastoral (agricultural) terms, connected with the people and place and related to the life of ordinary people. His teachings are simple, non philosophical and connected with people's lives.

The second allegation is that the Christian Faith looks down on Hindu faith and destroys its culture. There are two aspects to this: (i) the doctrinal (of the teaching) and (ii) of practice.

The Doctrinal aspect: Jesus Christ is the God made Man, that Christians worship as the Lord and Saviour. Hostility or enmity of any kind has two aspects: i. **militaristic- meant to acquire power or to hold on to power;** ii. **Idealistic; - meant to hold on to one's superior idea or impose one's superior idea on others, by force.**

i. Militaristic: The entire intervention of Jesus in human history is devoid of power, is rather a show of complete powerlessness. He is born a poor child, in a stable because he has no place to be born, to poor working parents, and gathers poor fisher folk around him. This cannot be called power seeking or power imposing. He has no palace, no army, and no force of volunteers to defend him. Jesus has no power to hold on, and when before being condemned to death, the Judge (Pilate) asks him where is his power, he clearly answers that he has no power on earth.

ii. Idealistic: Jesus does not teach or announce any ideas that seek to dominate or impose something on others. On the contrary he teaches that the humble, the meek, the peace makers,

those who suffer will be rewarded. He tells that poverty is not a curse, but can be lived with dignity, without craving for possessions. So there is absolutely no truth to the accusations that the teachings of Jesus are hegemonistic, dominating or seeking to dominate or harm others. On the contrary, his encounters with people of non jewish origins, who follow other faiths are gentle, nurturing, encouraging and even praising, not only about them as individuals but even their faith. The core and periphery of the teachings of Jesus : is love. God's intervention in human history (Jesus Christ) is an intervention devoid of any semblance of power. The Christian faith's central belief is that world has been created by God. The inflection point in the history is that God intervened in the human history because evil or sin by whatever name you call it disrupts the relationship of love and friendship that God has with man. Man's rebellion against God, is essentially a disruption of his relationship with God, which God comes to restore through the birth, death and resurrection of Jesus. There is no statement of any kind against any one, direct or veiled against others, because he is always a benevolent and merciful God and He defines as such "I am the God of Love and abundant mercy". He clearly teaches that others who do not belong to their group will find eternal life, because they accept his teachings. There is no exclusivism.

Teachings of Love: God's intervention in human history is to restore the relationship (acceptance of God's love) and this restoration requires of him, that he or she must love one another, because every man or woman is a child of God. There is not the remotest idea or inequality or estrangement from the community of God, therefore no form or idea of enmity, discrimination on any grounds is acceptable, in the community of God's love circle. If a man tells his friend about how good and effective his doctor is, and the friend too consults the same doctor, has anyone's freedom been violated? If I talk to others about the beautiful environment where I have built my house and others too follow suit, whose freedom is being violated? If a Christian tells his friends how good are the religious services in his search and how good it feels when the teachings of Jesus talk about

love and forgiveness, and others join him, in doing the same, whose freedoms are being violated? If a sick man is advised by his friend to pray to Jesus for curing him of his ailment and the friend gets healed (by whatever means) but he feels that Jesus has healed him and decides to follow him, whose freedom is being violated?

WHY DO PEOPLE CHANGE WHAT THEY DO AND DECIDE TO DO SOMETHING ELSE? WHAT HAS THAT TO DO WITH ONE'S LOYALTY TO THE NATION?

Why do some people decide to change their dress habits from the traditional Indian dress to western dress habits, or change from traditional Indian foods to continental cuisine? What makes them change their minds? Is it some external force or some government action? Why do some people leave a lucrative job and start their own businesses? Who makes that choice, and what compels him to do it? Why do people vote for the party of their choice, and not the party that has been asking them for votes, even with promises of better things? Why do more and more young men and women choose the person they get married to, in spite of the opposition of their family?

Why do people change what they dress, they eat, how they vote, what type of occupation they want to follow, and whom they want to get married and live with, for life? Are not each of those acts, conversions, personal compulsions or choices, and are they not legitimate? Does eating a type of food, wearing a type of clothes, or engaging in some kind of occupation, or marrying a person of one's choice, or not marrying at all or for that matter praying in particular manner, or not praying at all, make a difference to his or her loyalty to the nation? Does any of those choices make any one of them more or less Indian?

How many millions of people in India, Hindus, Muslims, Christians, etc do not attend celebrations in their temples, mosques or churches, although they worship their God in their hearts? How would that matter to their loyalty to the nation or to their nationalism? How does a choice that a person makes to go to a temple or a church, pray to a God of his or her choice, affect his or her loyalty to the Nation? And how does that choice become cause of action, for others to take violent

anyone?

When Bhimrao Ambedkar stood up against the institutionalized and endemic oppression of fellow Indians, condemned to do menial jobs due to their poverty, that cast them out as untouchables, and his silent revolution led to lakhs of Indians embracing Buddhism as their faith, who converted them? What converted them? Which part of our nationalism did they offend? Considering that a change from one faith to another, could alter the social relations in a group such as marriages and political affiliations do, how are these objectionable? Does not a Christian have equal rights as a citizen of the country as much as a Hindu or Muslim? Have not Christians walked hand in hand with fellow Indians in the freedom struggle, fought for the country's liberation and gave their lives, and toiled and worked hard, head to head with fellow Indians to build the India that we have? Considering even in the worst case that someone has changed his religion because he has been given some benefits of food or education, does he not have the right to choose better food or better education?

The problem of cultivated hate and violence against Christians or Muslims, commandeered action against Christians or Muslims has other considerations that do not pass the test of good reasoning, and every thinking Indian proud of his country and the Constitution must be alert to this disruption and raise his or her voice loud and clear, or else, something similar may happen to you for different reasons. The idea of hate, never stops hating, as much as the idea of love never stops forgiving! There is no choice here! The more our lawmakers pander to the idea of 'ethnic democracy', and the justice system plays spectator, the easier it will be for us to turn our democracy into an ethnic autocracy where few will decide what we eat, how we dress, what work we do, what we think and how we worship.

The idea of conversion is the idea of personal choice, and personal choices are what make one individual different from the other, make him or her free, as every Indian has a right to be!

Advances in Computing, Communication and Control (ICAC3'21) 7th Edition at FCRCE

Fr. Conceicao Rodrigues College of Engineering, Bandra organized the seventh edition of the biennial multidisciplinary International Conference on Advances in Computing, Communication and Control (ICAC3'21), on 3rd and 4th December 2021, with a primary goal to promote research and development activities in Computing, Communication and Control in India and the rest of the world.

The conference aims to offer a collaborative platform for academics, research and Industry, to address emerging issues and solutions in the areas mentioned above. Over the years, this international conference has gained repute for quality deliberations, effective feedback on paper presentations, and pre and post-conference support to authors and delegates.

This year's edition of the conference also witnessed an overwhelming response, with 145 papers received from researchers in India and abroad. A three-step rigorous review process was

followed to ensure the quality of the research papers selected for presentation during the conference. The first stage included an internal review to check the scope and plagiarism of the submission, followed by the second stage containing two blind reviews by experts and the last stage of one peer review.
